Autumn is here and with it comes the mysterious creature of the night. Students in 1.A started folding paper bats in art class and showed that they have determination and skill.

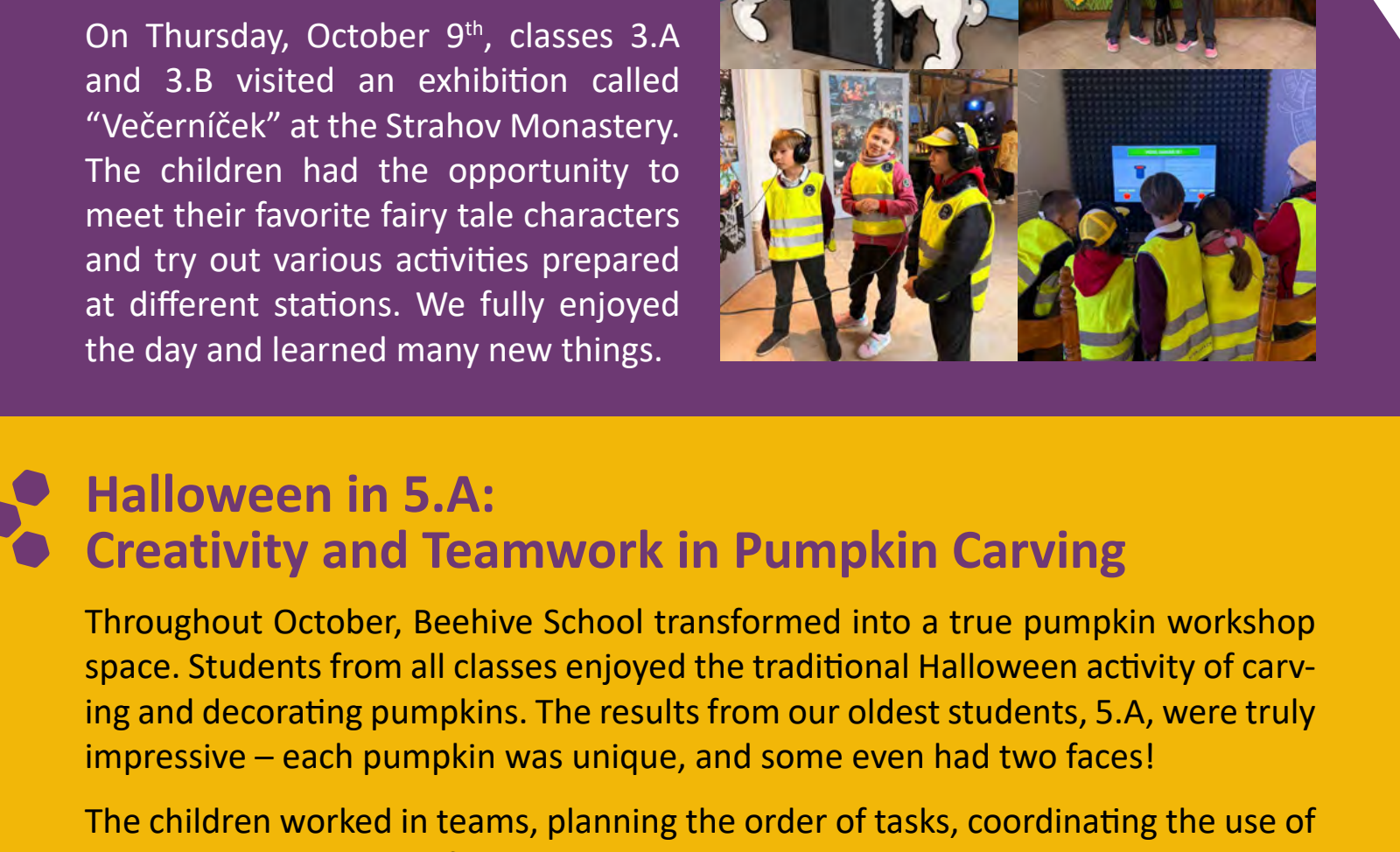

“My bat’s name is Dracula and he lives in a tower, but he sleeps during the day.”

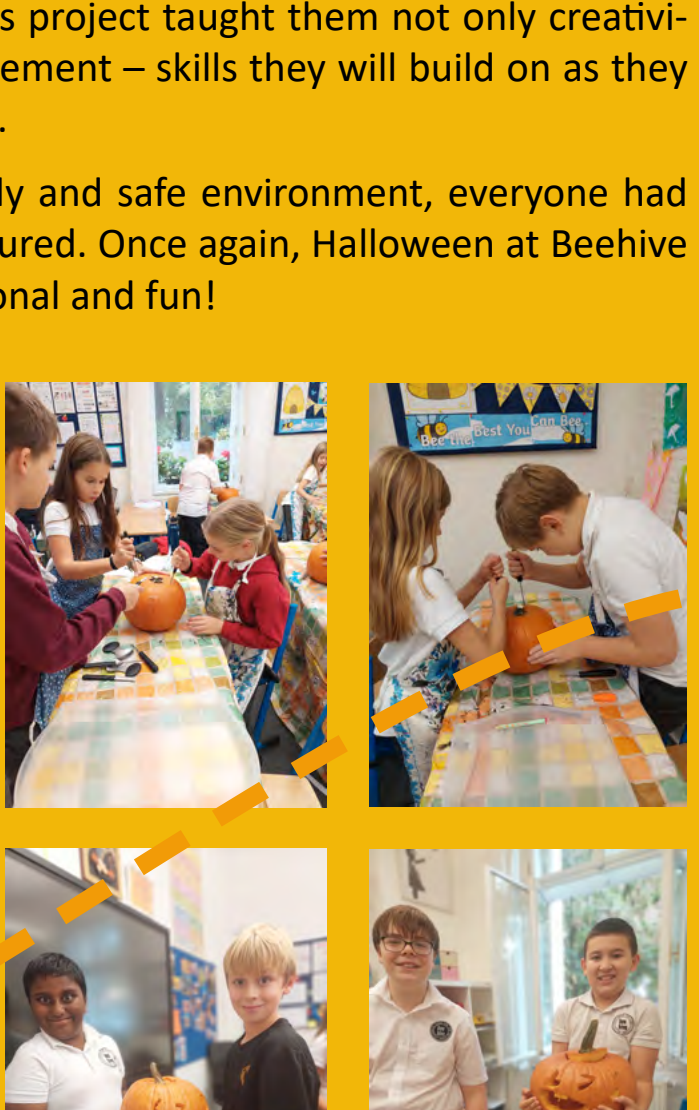
“Mine is flying to a Halloween party!”

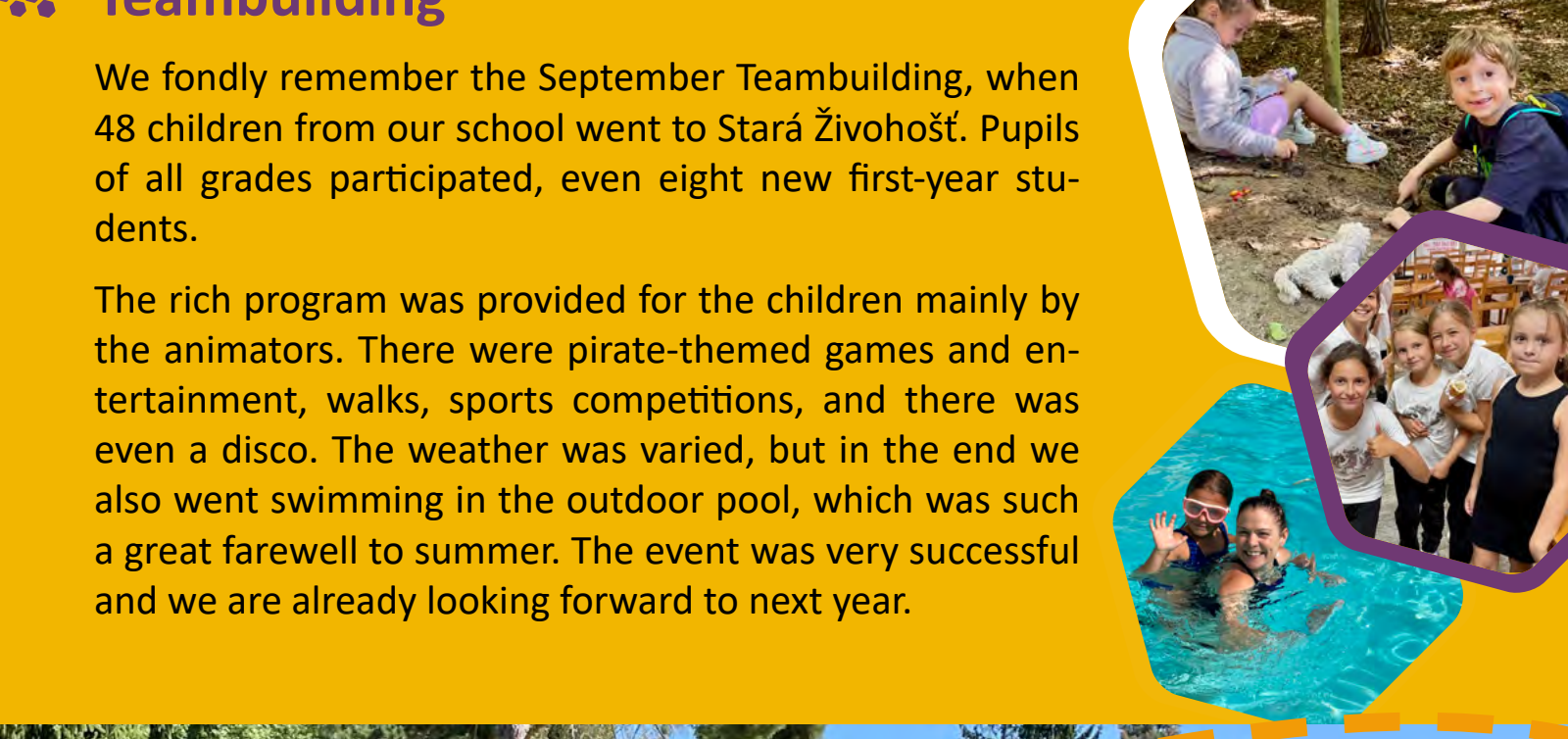


🐼 Preventive Program in 2.A – Building Our Class

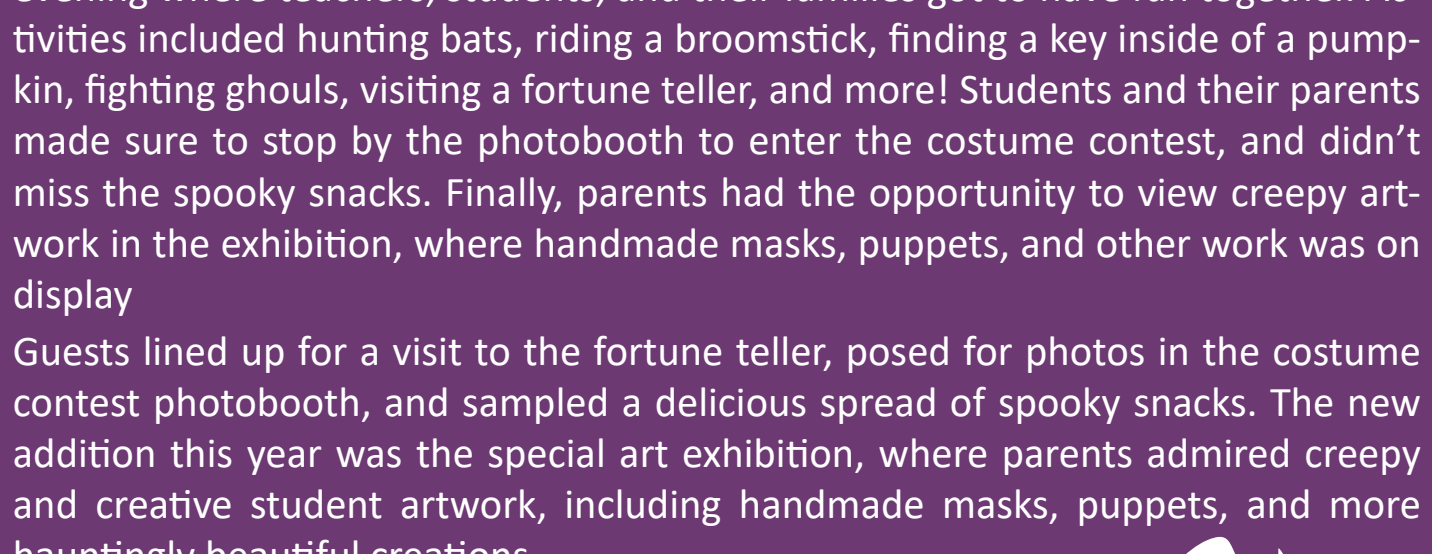

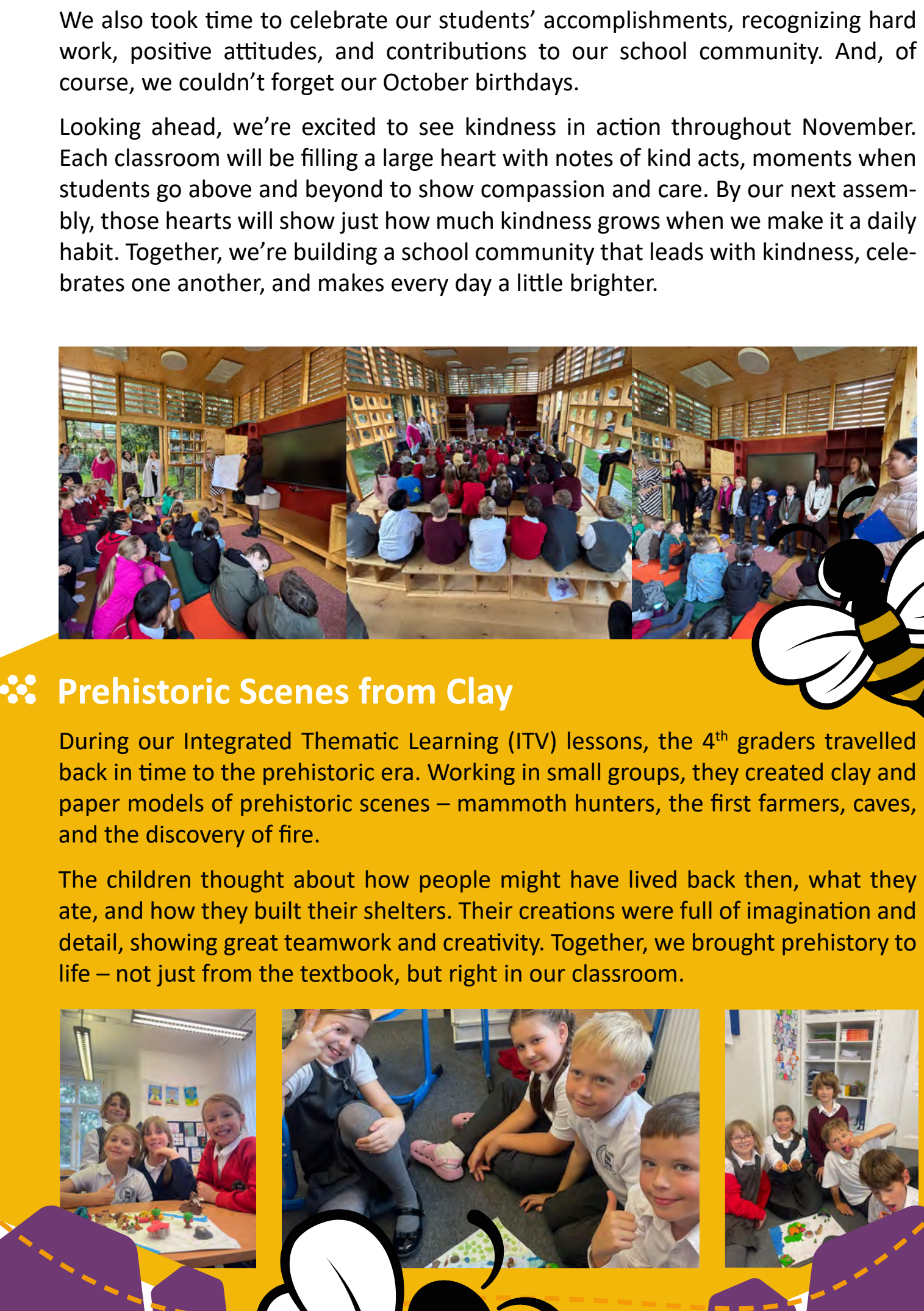
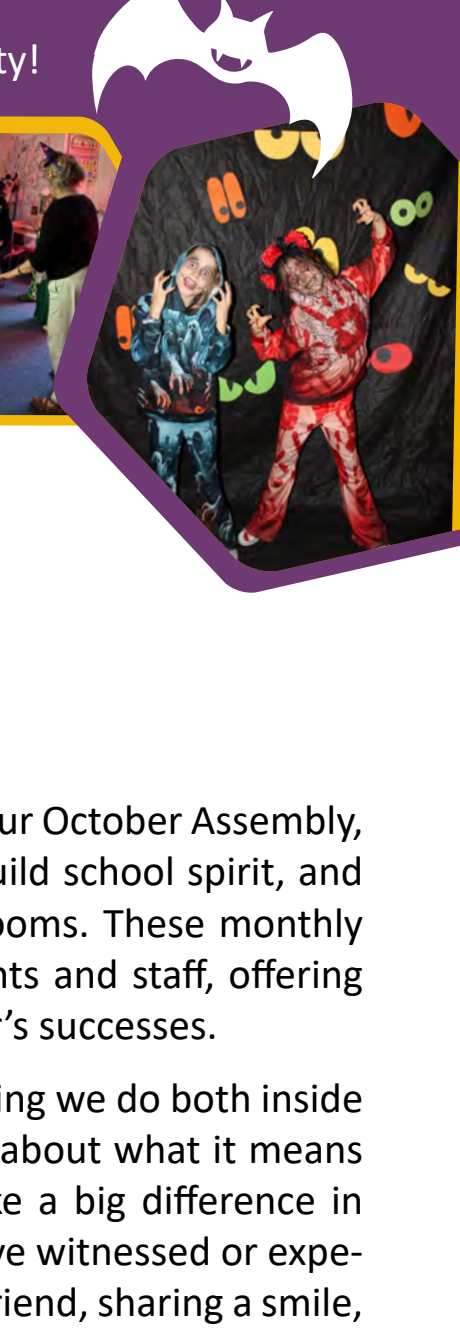

🐼 Prehistoric Scenes from Clay

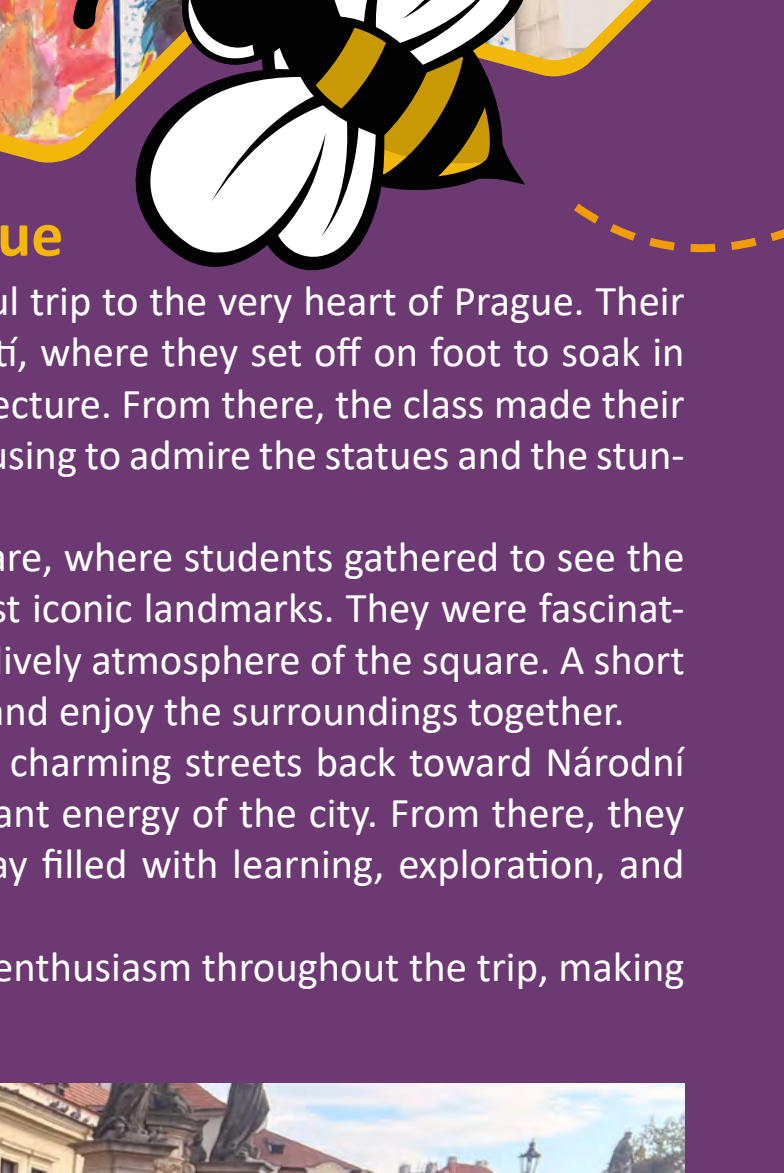
During our Integrated Thematic Learning (ITV) lessons, the 4th graders travelled back in time to the prehistoric era. Working in small groups, they created clay and paper models of prehistoric scenes – mammoth hunters, the first farmers, caves, and the discovery of fire.

The children thought about how people might have lived back then, what they ate, and how they built their shelters. Their creations were full of imagination and detail, showing great teamwork and creativity. Together, we brought prehistory to life – not just from the textbook, but right in our classroom.

🐼 Smoking Prevention Program in 5.A

Last week, children from 5.A took part in a smoking prevention program. This program, run by Jules a Jim, a company we have been working with for many years, aims to delay or, better still, discourage pupils from experimenting with tobacco products and provides them with the opportunity to form their own negative attitude towards smoking. The pupils learned about basic concepts, the most common risks of smoking tobacco products (including electronic cigarettes and heated tobacco), and ways to protect themselves from the dangers of passive smoking. They practiced appropriate ways to refuse a cigarette and learned how tobacco addiction manifests and develops. The two-hour program was packed with information, and the children not only listened attentively to the presentation but also worked in pairs and groups.

🐼 Dragon’s Roar in 1.A: an Incredible Spectacle
